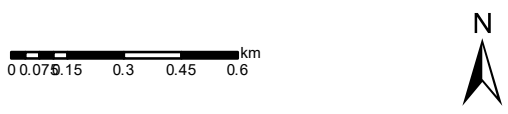




Keillour Forest Issues and Constraints Map

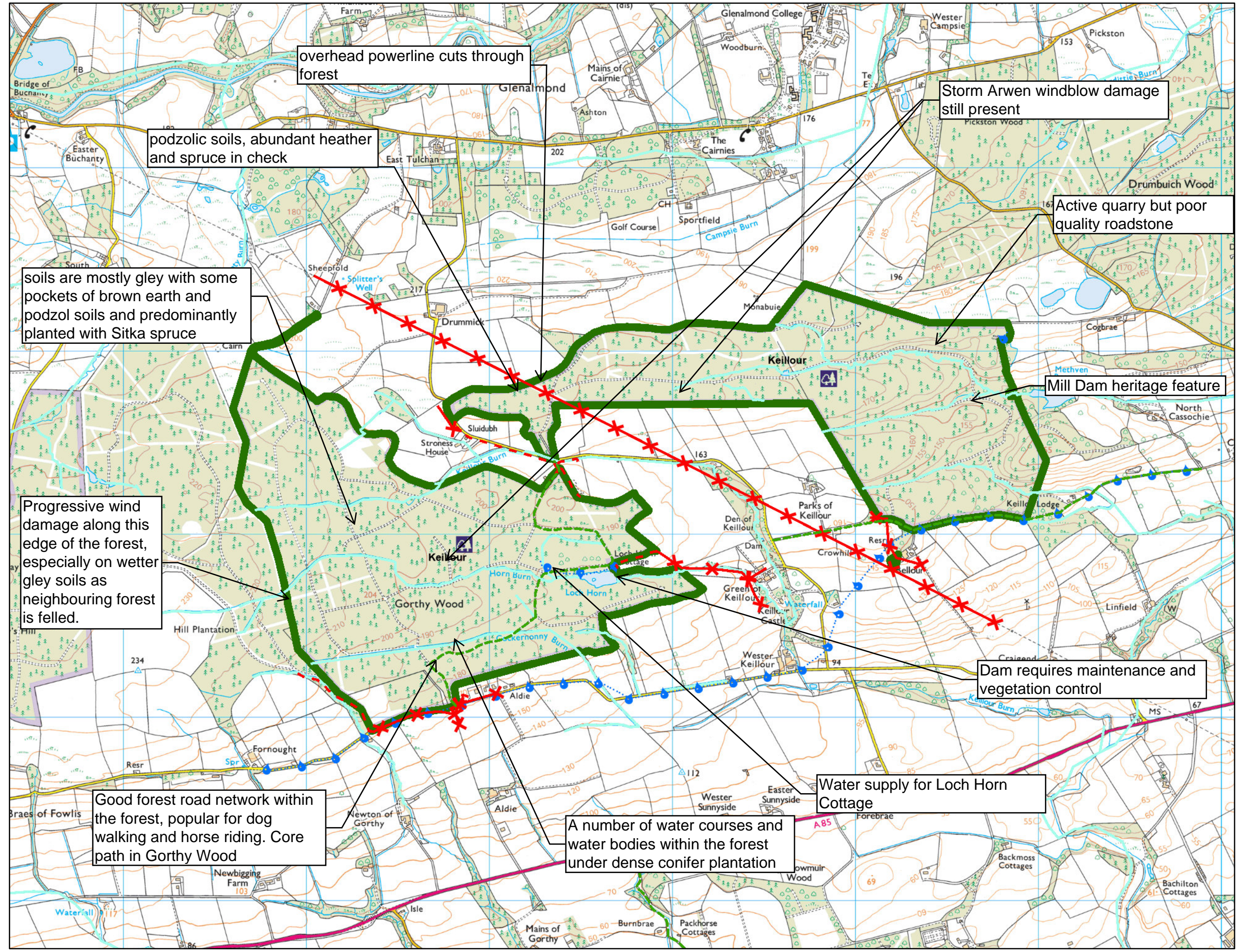

overhead powerline cuts through forest

podzolic soils, abundant heather and spruce in check

Storm Arwen windblow damage still present

Active quarry but poor quality roadstone

soils are mostly gley with some pockets of brown earth and podzol soils and predominantly planted with Sitka spruce

Mill Dam heritage feature

Progressive wind damage along this edge of the forest, especially on wetter gley soils as neighbouring forest is felled.

Dam requires maintenance and vegetation control

Good forest road network within the forest, popular for dog walking and horse riding. Core path in Gorthy Wood

A number of water courses and water bodies within the forest under dense conifer plantation

Water supply for Loch Horn Cottage
